NLS Summer Reading Program

The 2024 National Library Service for the Blind and Print Disabled's summer reading program, "Adventure begins at your library", will run from Monday, June 24 through Friday, Au-

gust 9, 2024 and includes an author talk, story time, music



session, and interactive programs. All events will be held virtually—so anyone, anywhere, can attend! There is an age suggestion for each event but every program is open to all.

Here is the summer reading program schedule:

Monday, June 24 at 4 p.m. EDT: (All ages) Kickoff event with Dr. Carla Hayden, the Librarian of Congress who will read *Alma and How She Got Her Name* by Juana Martinez-Neal (BR 22572, DBC08652).

Thursday July 18 at 4 p.m. EDT: Story time and music by Turtle Dance Music (Designed for K-3rd grade but all are welcome.)

Thursday, July 25 at 7 p.m. EDT: Author Talk with New York Times Best-selling Author Angeline Boulley with the moderator, Andrea L. Rogers. (YA and Adult): Firekeeper's Daughter (BR24040, DB102762) and Warrior Girl Unearthed (BR25116 in process, DB114761).

BTBL will also feature adventure themed reading lists, craft ideas and more. There will be a Grand Prize Drawing for participants at the end of the program.



Pop Up at Your Senior Center



Book Discussion Group





A Minute with Marie

Do you remember back to your schooldays? If so, you may recall Highlights magazine. There were two characters the magazine used to present little fables about the right way and wrong way to handle things, Goofus and Gallant. I have my own story about the Goofus and Gallant characters I ran into during a recent trip.

Here's what happened to me on a flight to Seattle to visit my daughter and her family. Once we had taken off and the refreshment cart was coming down the aisle, I got out the brand-new water bottle I had brought to drink my water from. I like a covered container instead of those Styrofoam cups which are too tippy and don't hold enough. I handed the flight steward my open container to fill up and he said he couldn't do that. I apologized and took back the container and said I could fill it myself if he would just give me two cups of water. At that point he took back the container and filled it up for me and handed it back so I could replace the top on it. The cart moved forward so now the same flight steward was standing pretty much at my shoulder. I could see that he leaned forward to talk to his cart partner and whispered, in a stage whisper, "B-L-I-N-D". Everything in me wanted to respond, "Yes, blind but not D-E-A-F!" To this day, I still regret that I didn't actually say that!

On the Gallant side of that trip I came across a lovely gentleman who assisted me, verbally, down the jetway. I don't use the airport wheelchair when walking down the jetway; I just preboard and walk slowly with my wheeled carry-on bag. This wonderful person saw my mobility cane stowed on top of my luggage and proceeded to let me know whether there was a handrail or not, an incline in the floor, and any other pertinent details about my journey down the jetway. It was an extraordinary act of thoughtfulness and kindness and was much appreciated.

No matter how well you plan your large trip or small outing you may well run into your Goofus and Gallant types. Don't let that stop you from venturing out! Think of these folks as part of the large mosaic of human behaviors that everyone runs into daily. I find that overall the Gallant types will certainly outnumber the Goofus types. Happy Travels!

Book Lovers by Emily Henry. "Cutthroat literary agent Nora Stephens agrees to go to Sunshine Falls, North Carolina, when her sister Libby begs her to accompany her on vacation." DB 107926 Also available in large print.

Hard Day for a Hangover: Sunshine Vicram, book 3 by Darynda Jones "Some people greet the day with open arms. Sheriff Sunshine Vicram would rather give it a hearty shove and get back into bed, because there's just too much going on right now. There's a series of women going missing, and Sunny feels powerless to stop it." DB 111258

Out of the Clear Blue Sky by Kristan Higgins. "Lillie Silva knew life as an empty nester would be hard after her only child left for college, but when her husband abruptly dumps her for another woman just as her son leaves, her world comes crashing down." DB 108658 Also available in large print.

Reader Recommendations

Lawrence Robbins recommends Congo by Michael Crichton. "A bright and beautiful woman computer scientist from a Houston-based corporation with global interests, a scientist accompanied by a gorilla who uses sign language, and a professional soldier/ hunter all depart on a fearsome expedition into deepest Africa. Thanks to their knowledge of technology, history, gorilla language, and geography they are successful in their search for the lost city of Zinj and for the diamonds that are the raw materials for computer chips that will revolutionize the industry." Kathy's Choice

I suggest two remarkable novels for your summer reading. The first is *Still Life* by Sarah Winman. This story is a lot of wonderful things rolled into one: a family saga which covers four decades, a history of Italy in the post WWII years, art history and the love of art in all forms. It is a character-driven novel and there is a rich group of them whom you will grow to love as you read through this beautiful novel. **DB 105510**, 14 hrs., 56 mins.

My second recommendation is Firekeeper's Daughter by Angeline Boulley. Daunis, who is part Ojibwe, defers attending the University of Michigan to care for her mother. When Daunis witnesses a shocking murder, she reluctantly agrees to go undercover, drawing on her knowledge of chemistry and Ojibwe traditional medicine to track down the source of a new drug. This was a very readable story appealing to adults as well as high school and young adult readers. The appeal to the younger readers will be the fact that the main character is the same. DB 102762, 14 hrs., 16 mins.

New Materials at MLBPD

We have new materials for check-out at the Macomb Library for the Blind.

Wheatly Tactile Diagramming Kit: For patrons with low vision or who are blind and their caregivers, this kit allows one to diagram a room, a floor of a building or even a neighborhood street with tactile Velcro pieces that can be placed on the included felt board. Diagram someone's living room to indicate where a chair, sofa, and television set are located. Diagram the way from the front door to a classroom. These are just two examples on giving a person with low or no vision a tactile way to feel the diagram and then understand how to navigate the location. This kit has been used by mobility specialists to aid their clients in navigating spaces. Patrons or their caregivers can check out the kit with their valid library card in order to try it out at home.

QuickTalker: For patrons who are non-verbal, the Quick Talker speech device uses panels of pictures and sound to aid in communication with patrons unable to speak. Picture panels illustrate basic information for daily use such as "hungry," "thirsty," "help." Patrons or their caregivers can check out this device with their valid library card in order to try it out at home.

Main Library Construction

As you know, the Clinton-Macomb Public Library (CMPL) is home to the Macomb Library for the Blind. This June, the Main Library will begin renovations to improve the building. CMPL plans to keep the Main Library open and operational as much as possible during this renovation. However, there will be times when the building, or specific areas in the building, will not be accessible.

Phase one of the renovation work will begin in the staff parking lot where we will begin the process of updating the current HVAC system to a geothermal system, like the heating and cooling system at the North Branch. You may wish to use the Romeo Plank entrance to the Main Library during this time.

Phase one will also include exterior work on the parking lot and the new drive-thru window. The biggest impact of the first phase of renovations will be the closure of all meeting rooms and study rooms at the library. These rooms will be unavailable to the public beginning June 1 as the library works to shift staff and materials to these spaces while improvements are being made. Both branches have meeting rooms and study rooms available to schedule during the downtime at the Main Library. We apologize for this inconvenience.

Thank you for bearing with us as we work to improve the Main Library to ensure that it is a landmark community space for decades to come.
